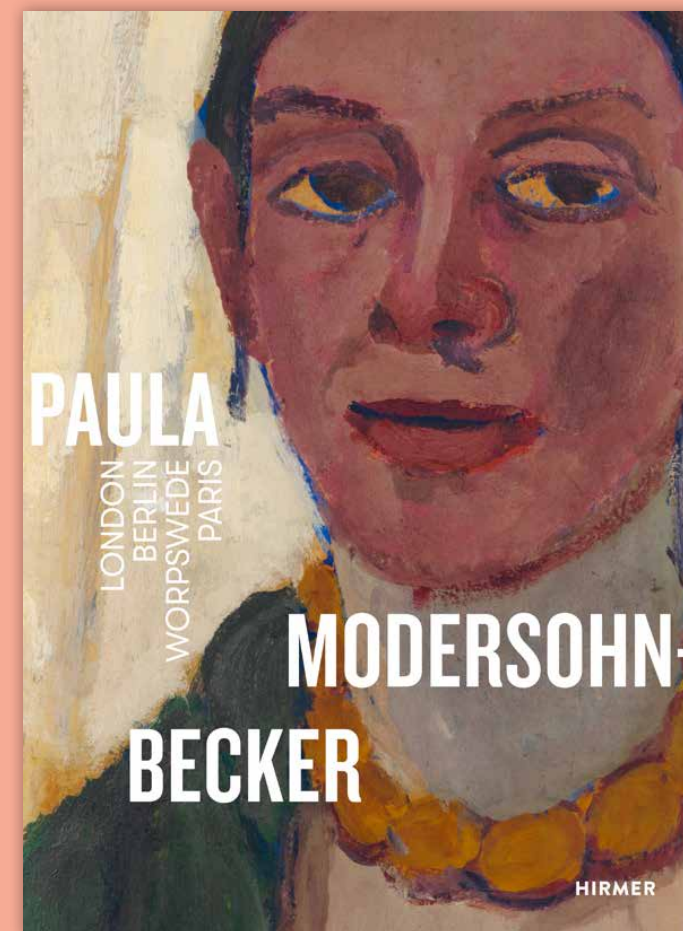
From Paula Becker to cult figure – the making of an exceptional artist

PAULA MODERSOHN-BECKER London–Berlin–Worpswede–Paris

Happy Birthday, Paula Modersohn-Becker! This volume celebrates 150 years since the birth of this remarkable artist, who is still regarded as one of the most important figures of the German avant-garde. Examining her artistic development in depth and presenting works from all phases of her career, the publication focuses in particular on her early work, which has hitherto received little attention or recognition.

Modersohn-Becker was one of the most influential artists of the twentieth century, inspiring such major figures as Georg Baselitz and Chantal Joffe. Numerous works from renowned collections and private holdings illustrate how Paula Becker, born in Dresden in 1876, became an artist, charting her progress and highlighting the original path she followed even in her student years. Paula Modersohn-Becker's unique oeuvre has achieved international fame and is celebrated today in literature, film and art.

Frank Schmidt has been director of the Paula Modersohn-Becker Museum in Bremen since 2016.

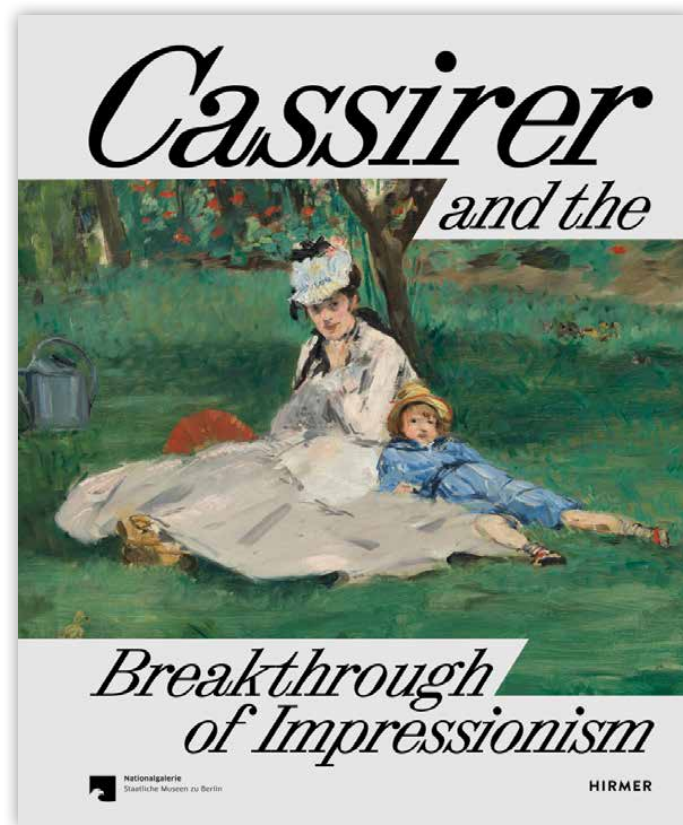

From Cézanne to Kokoschka – Cassirer’s Modernist Masters in Germany



Anette Hüscher was director of the Kunsthalle zu Kiel from 2010 to 2025 and has been director of the Alte Nationalgalerie in Berlin since March 2025. Josephine Klinger has been a research associate at the Alte Nationalgalerie since 2022 and is completing her doctorate on Paul Cassirer at the Technical University in Berlin. Franziska Lietzmann has worked on various exhibition projects for the Alte Nationalgalerie in Berlin since 2015 and is researching its history.

CASSIRER AND THE BREAKTHROUGH OF IMPRESSIONISM

All the leading figures of French Impressionism found their way to the Berlin gallery of Paul Cassirer (1871–1926). This richly illustrated volume traces the footsteps of the art dealer whose engagement in cultural circles and work as a gallerist contributed decisively to Impressionism’s eventual acceptance and appreciation in Germany.

Degas, Cézanne, Manet, Monet and van Gogh – that these great names are found in so many German collections today is due in particular to Paul Cassirer. The Berlin art dealer was also committed to German Impressionism, supporting Berlin Secession painters including Liebermann, Corinth and Slevogt and championing avant-garde artists from Munch and Barlach to Kirchner and Modersohn-Becker. This volume presents outstanding works of Impressionism and classical modernism that found their way into German museums and collections as a result of Cassirer’s influence.

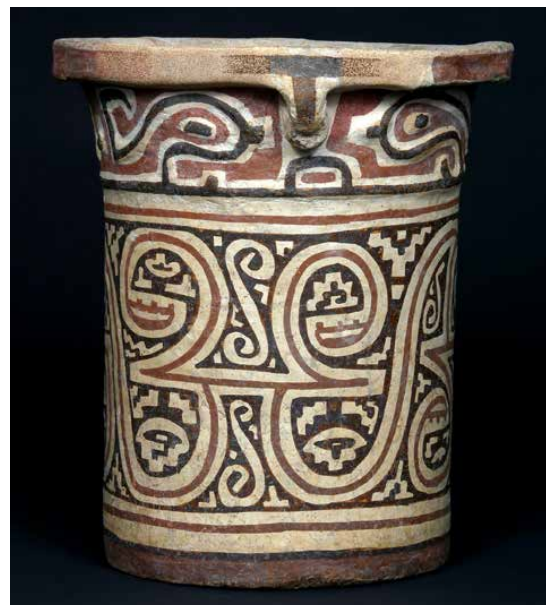

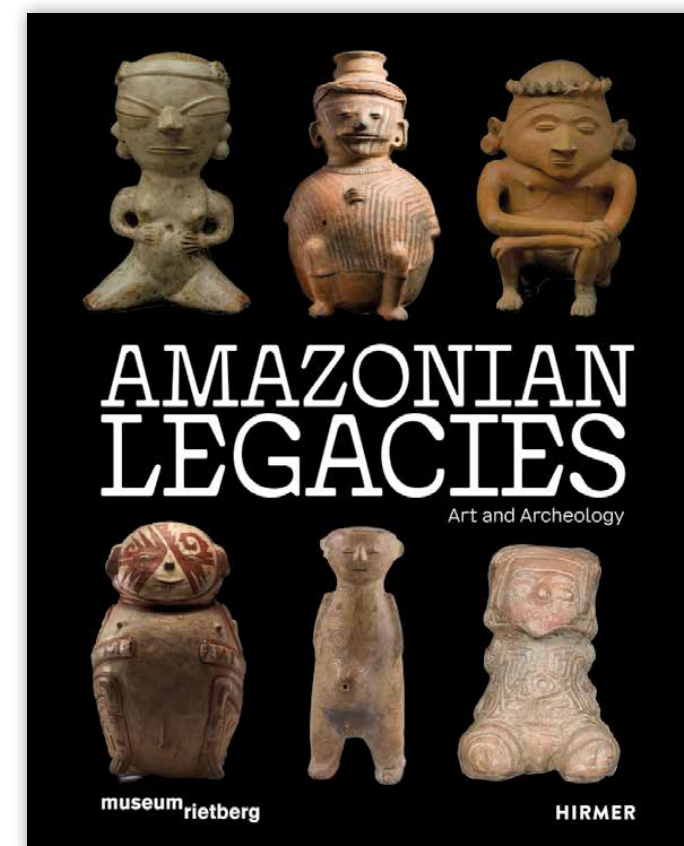


Where nature and culture meet. Thirteen thousand years of art and history

AMAZONIAN LEGACIES Art and Archaeology

This new book on the archaeology of the world's largest rainforest region introduces readers to the most recent research: sensational discoveries and revolutionary insights paint a picture of an exceptionally rich and diverse cultural landscape whose origins extend back to the twelfth millennium BP.

With its lush rainforest and mysterious rivers, Amazonia is widely regarded as the epitome of untouched nature. Yet deep within the green undergrowth lie traces of past civilisations. This publication opens up a new perspective on the cultural history of Amazonia, presenting spectacular archaeological finds and recounting the story of highly developed cultures that flourished long before the colonial era. It vividly demonstrates how body painting, jewellery and rock art open windows onto spiritual worlds, and how past and present are strikingly intertwined.

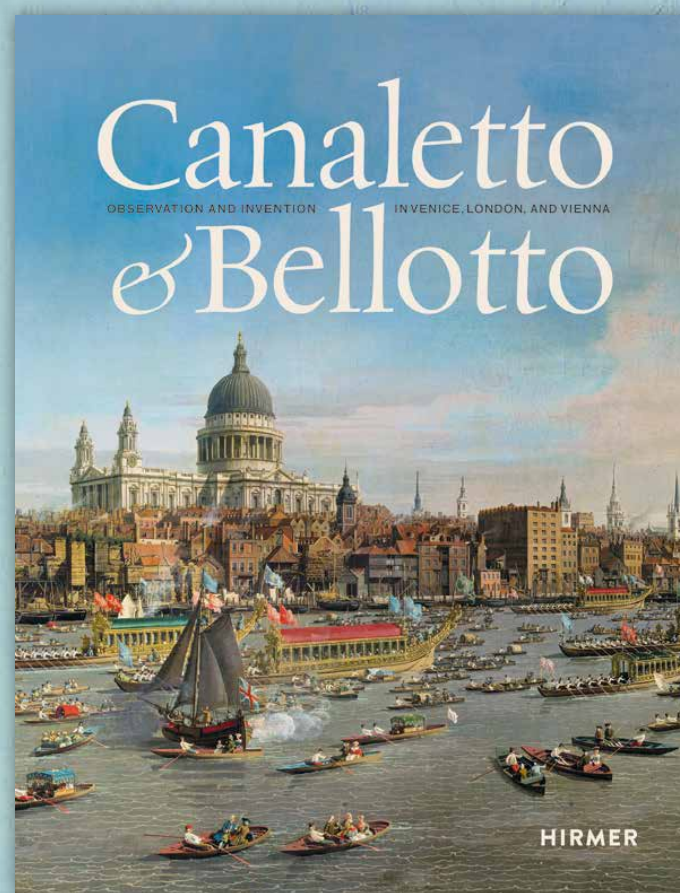

City images in the eighteenth century: Canaletto and Bellotto paint Venice, London, and Vienna



Mateusz Mayer has been Junior Curator of the Picture Gallery at the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna since 2025.

CANALETTO & BELLOTTO Observation and Invention in Venice, London, and Vienna

Giovanni Antonio Canal, called Canaletto, and his nephew Bernardo Bellotto used their richly detailed cityscapes to shape public understanding of the places they depicted. Mateusz Mayer vividly describes how Venice became the stage for a resplendent republican tradition, London a vision of bourgeois pride, and Vienna a setting for imperial representation – characterisations that continue to shape how we see these cities today.

In a journey back to eighteenth-century Europe, this volume lucidly reveals how the two painters Canaletto and Bellotto used the latest optical instruments and analytical observation to create a fascinatingly lifelike image of urban architecture. At the same time, through theatrical staging, they transformed streets and squares into vibrant platforms for human society, populated by aristocrats and street vendors, courtly ceremony and everyday labour. Their pictures offer a wealth of narrative detail in which viewers are only too happy to lose themselves.

Explore Leonor Fini's magical world of ideas – in her first major retrospective in Germany



LEONOR FINI

A notable book in the autumn arts season: a comprehensive look at Leonor Fini, a rebel in both her work and her personal life. Her brilliantly painted dreamlike scenes featuring powerful women, priestesses and sphinxes play with gender roles and invite the viewer into a fantastical world. Fini's self-assured examination of her role as artist and woman is strikingly on display.

Some 150 paintings, drawings and objects spanning 70 years showcase Fini's unmistakable visual language, suspended between dream, myth and theatrical staging. Emancipation, gender, eros, death and transformation pervade her work, as does a playful use of masks, costumes and role play. Numerous photographs and a detailed biography offer insights into the captivating personality of an artist who, from the very start, fashioned herself as a free-spirited and glamorous icon.

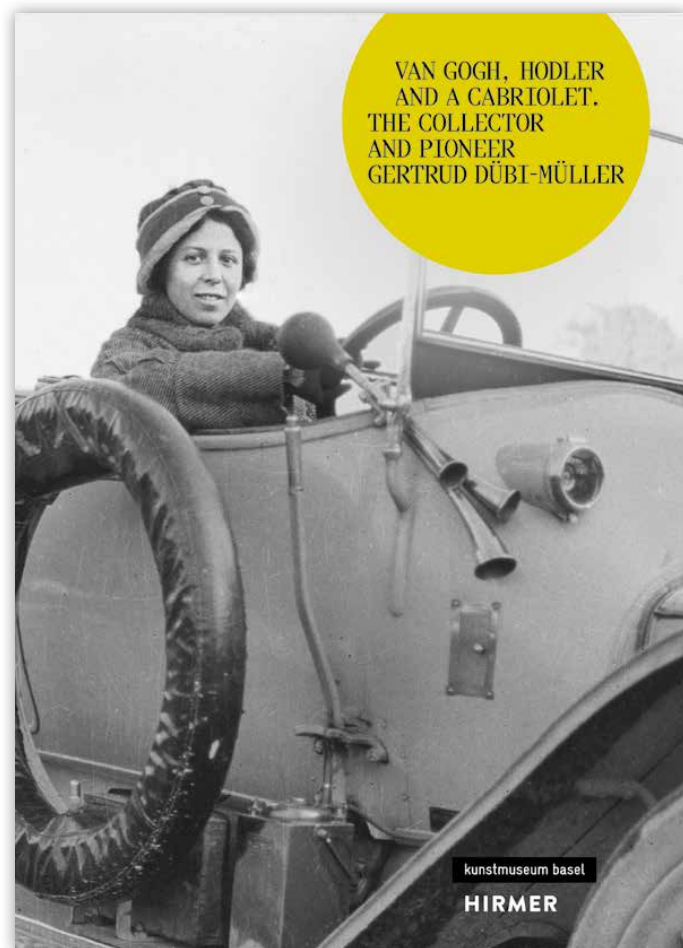

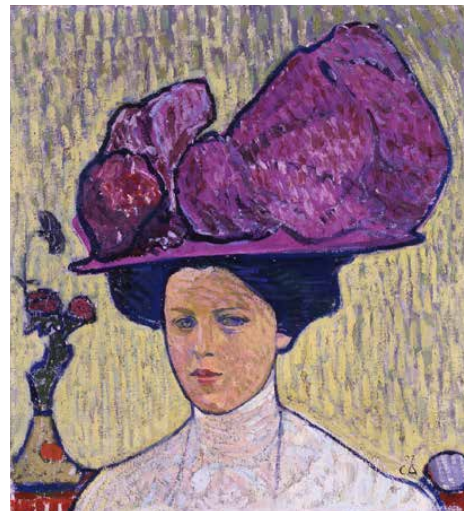


VAN GOGH, HODLER AND A CABRIOLET The Collector and Pioneer Gertrud Dübi-Müller

Gertrud Dübi-Müller (1888–1980) was one of Switzerland's most important art collectors as well as a passionate photographer, mountaineer, motorist and model for artists including Ferdinand Hodler. This publication presents works from her outstanding collection as well as her own photographs, offering insights into her fascinating, independent life.

Dübi-Müller was exceptionally well connected within Swiss and international artistic circles, and she collected works by Cézanne, van Gogh and Klimt, as well as Cuno Amiet and Ferdinand Hodler. As a photographer, she documented the lives of artist friends as well as her own experiences, including journeys across Europe and as far as North Africa. Whether mountaineering, motor racing or collecting art, Gertrud Dübi-Müller refused to be constrained by gender stereotypes and lived with remarkable independence for a woman of her time.

Géraldine Meyer holds a PhD in art history and has been a curator at the Stiftung Im Obersteg at the Kunstmuseum Basel since 2022, with a focus on classical modernism.

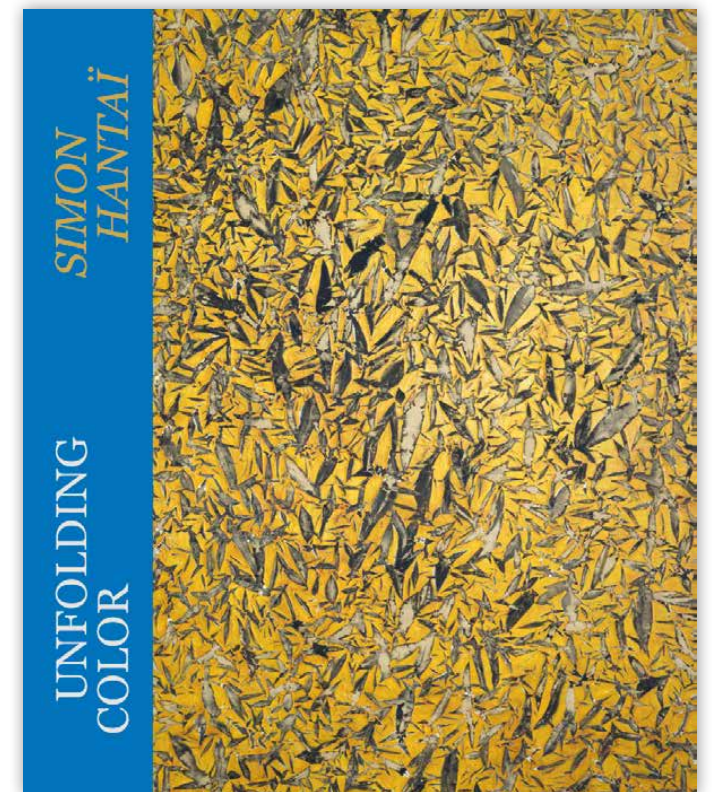
A comprehensive monograph presenting Hantaï's work as a sumptuous celebration of colour

UNFOLDING COLOR Simon Hantaï

The painter Simon Hantaï (1922–2008) turned chance into a tool. His prominent role within post-war international abstraction is linked to his innovative technique of working on folded canvas with luminous colour. Presenting numerous works produced across four decades, this multifaceted volume pays tribute to a fascinating figure of the Parisian avant-garde.

An encounter with Simon Hantaï is always rewarding, as he created an oeuvre that resembles a pyrotechnic display of colour and form. Based in Paris, he became influenced by Art Informel and the work of Jackson Pollock in the 1950s. A radically experimental search for new modes of expression was central to his oeuvre, and beginning in 1960 he developed the pliage technique, with intensely coloured patterns generated through the chance act of folding. This defined his work and continues to captivate an international audience today.

THE FANTASTIC GERHARD ALTENBOURG The Centennial

Whimsical scenes and bizarre monsters populate the work of Gerhard Altenburg (1926–1989), as they do this lavish anniversary publication, which brings together drawings, sketches and prints. The accompanying essays decode the artist's dream figures, bizarre landscapes and great symphonies of colour, converging in opulent picture spreads to evoke a journey of discovery through the fantastic worlds of Gerhard Altenburg.

Revered by his companions, spoken of as an insider tip, and long blocked in East Germany – Altenburg left a wide-ranging oeuvre that reveals his intense engagement with modern art movements. He furnished his “fantastic figurations,” full of grotesque beings and mythical creatures reminiscent of the Surrealists, with artful titles. To mark his centennial, this volume transports us into a singular, poetic visual domain in which the real world is recognisable yet distorted. Diversity and colour are united here in harmony.

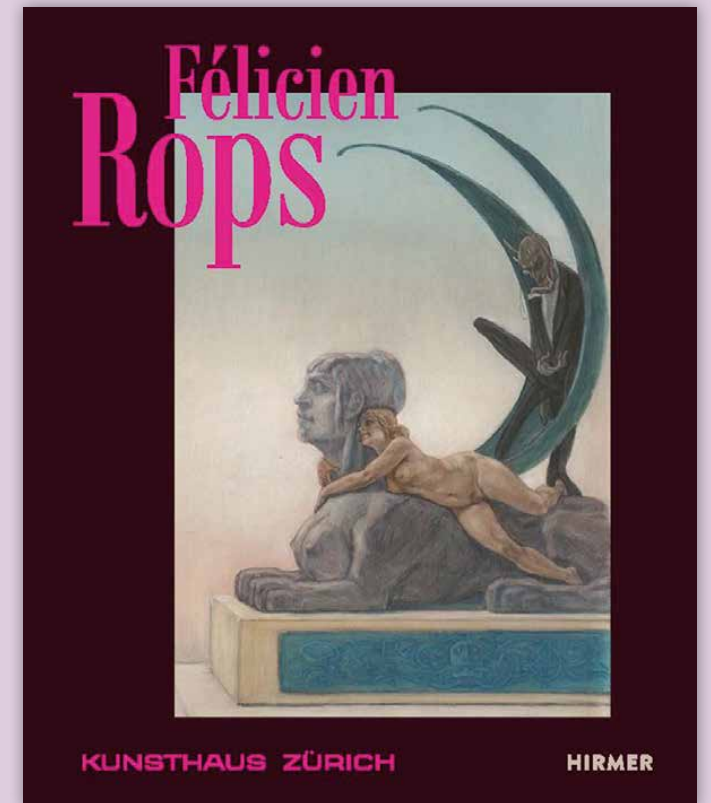

Sensual and provocative – a Belgian Symbolist mixes erotic art with social criticism

FÉLICIEN ROPS Laboratory of Lust

A master of Belgian Symbolism rediscovered! Félicien Rops's (1833–1898) erotic works remain provocative today – and in the nineteenth century, they transgressed every boundary of art. With a keen eye and a sharp pen, Rops exposed the hypocrisies of the respectable middle class. “I am Rops, and I wish to be no other!” he declared, and adhered to this maxim throughout his life.

The “most poisonous bloom of Symbolism”, a “scourge of the bourgeoisie” – many terms have been used to describe Rops's radical art. Celebrated by writers such as Charles Baudelaire and Joris-Karl Huysmans, he was a defiant figure who deliberately aimed his works against the double standards of bourgeois society. His pictures, representing an absolute highpoint of printmaking and draughtsmanship from the period, invite a critical examination of fin-de-siècle social attitudes, particularly with regard to gender roles.

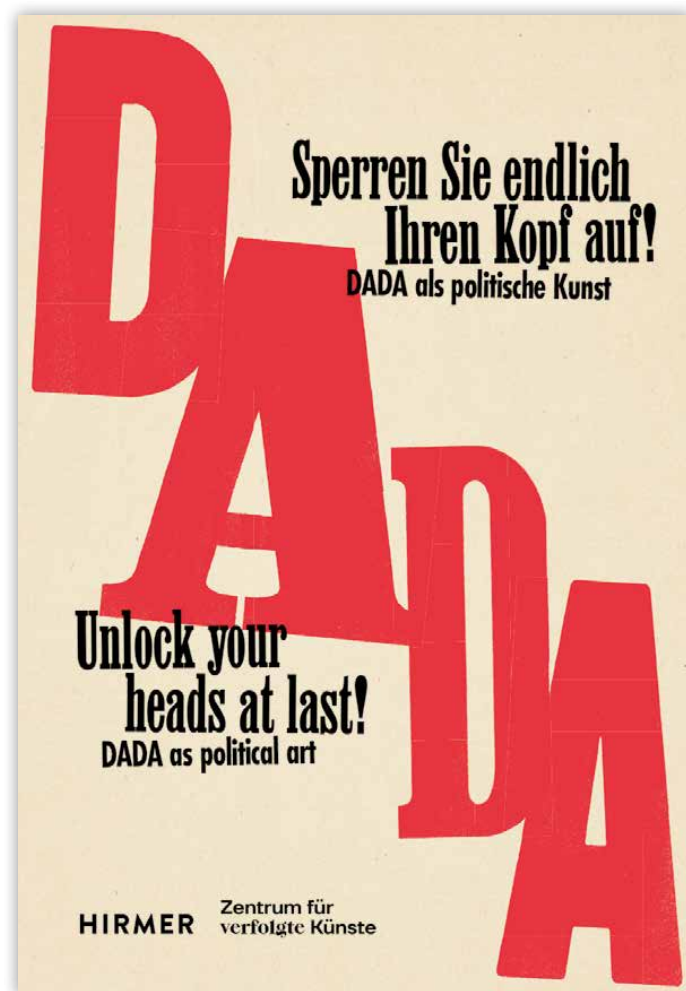

UNLOCK YOUR HEADS AT LAST! The political art of Dada between the wars

This book celebrates Dada, the art movement founded 110 years ago but whose subversive political engagement remains highly relevant today. With a keen eye and biting satire, Dada produced forceful critiques while examining political and social conditions. Featuring works by the most important Dada artists, this volume presents a multifaceted portrait of the movement and its many forms of expression, including painting, photography, theatre, dance, literature and satire.

An international group of experts recount the history of Dada from its beginnings in 1916 through to the 1930s. The volume focuses on the movement's political motives and social activities, which served to unite this heterogeneous group of visual artists, writers and theatre personalities. Emerging from the experience of the First World War, Dada artists issued urgent warnings about the rise of the Nazi dictatorship. The book vividly demonstrates how vital artistic voices can be in resisting inhumane and anti-democratic tendencies.

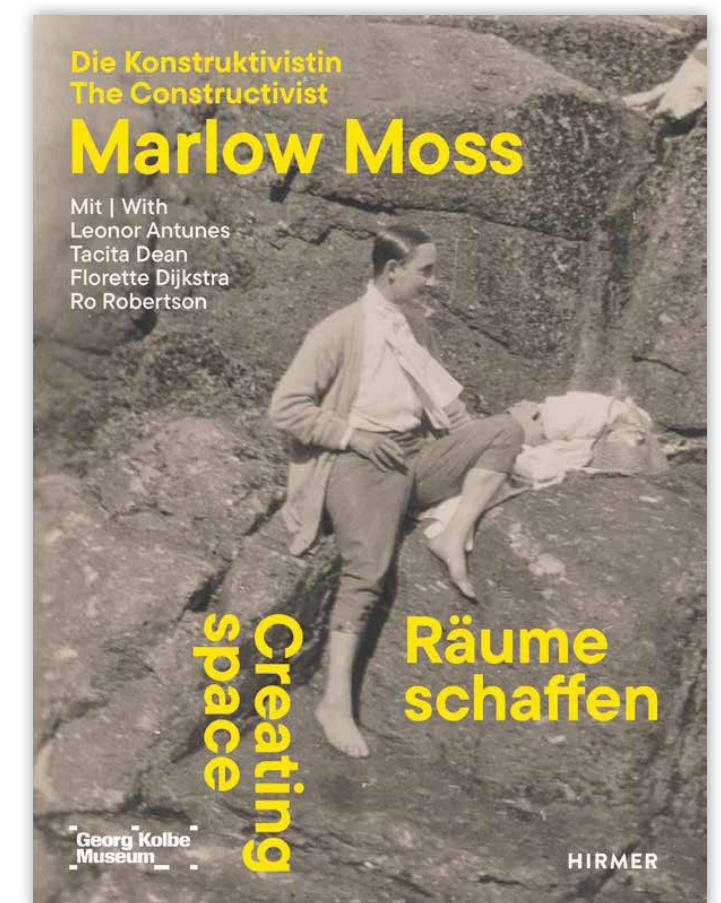
Visibility at last – in this book, the significant Constructivist emerges from the shadow of other great artists of her time. The work of her friend Piet Mondrian was an important source of inspiration for Marlow Moss, which she absorbed artistically and developed further. Because of her Jewish heritage and the destruction of the Second World War, parts of her oeuvre were lost; nevertheless, her work and life are now comprehensively recounted and reinterpreted by contemporary artists.

Alexis Rockman's Naples cycle – a defining statement on time and the fate of civilisations



Alexis Rockman, a painter based in Warren, Connecticut, is an environmental activist who began making paintings and works on paper to build environmental awareness in the mid-1980s. Rockman's work has been exhibited around the world and showcased at prestigious galleries and museums, such as the Venice Biennale, Carnegie Museum of Art, Smithsonian American Art Museum and Serpentine Galleries.

ALEXIS ROCKMAN Naples: Course of Empire

Time itself as protagonist: this publication, dedicated exclusively to Alexis Rockman's Naples cycle, presents the entire development of the seven panoramic paintings in great detail. By connecting art history with pressing contemporary realities, climate science and ecological collapse, the cycle paints a new picture of our civilisation.

Rather than presenting history as linear progress, the cycle unfolds as recurrence: creation, eruption, collapse and transformation repeating across vastly different scales of time. 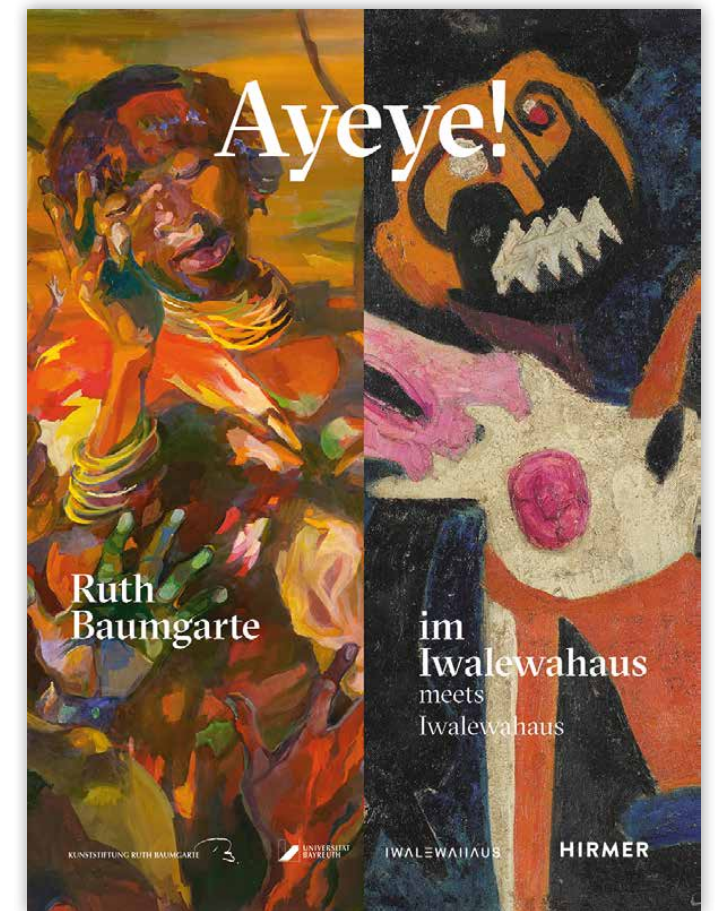
AYEYE! Ruth Baumgarte meets Iwalewaha

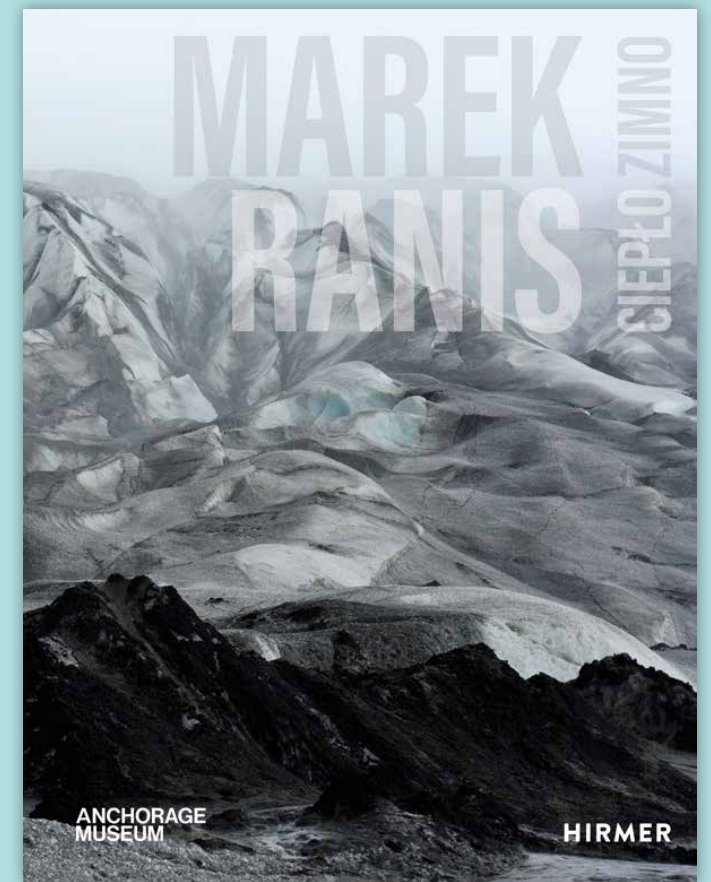


The human imprint on the world – three decades of Marek Ranis’s art, film and installation works

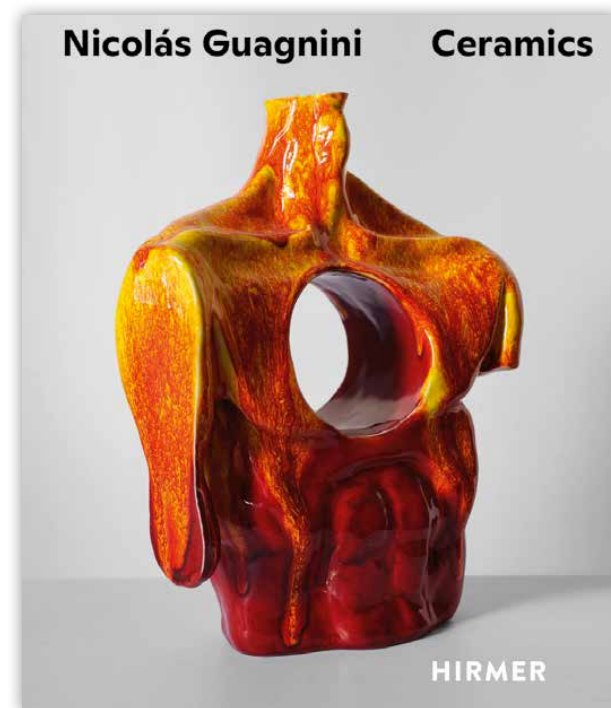

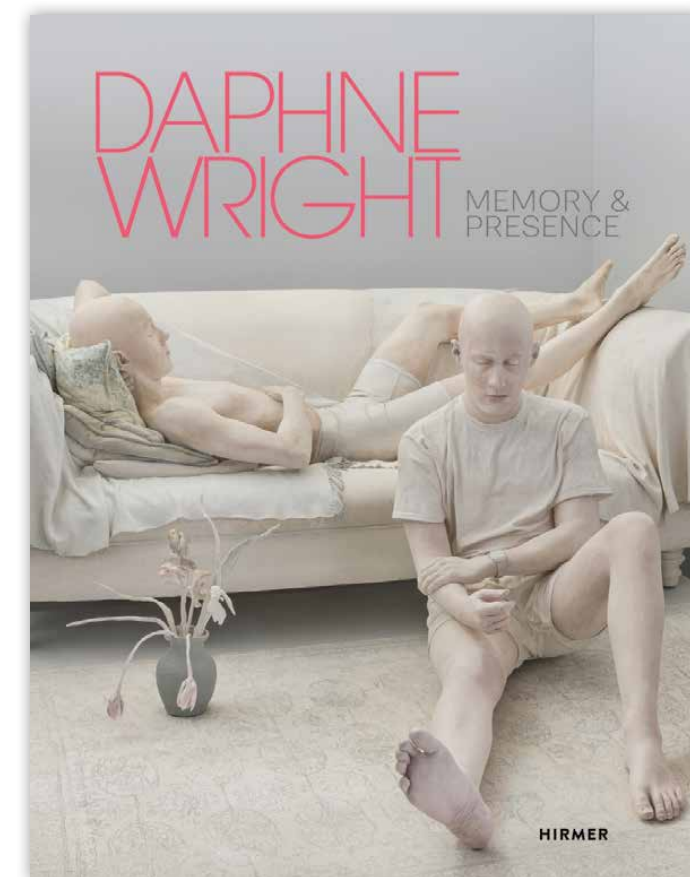


Between memory and presence – Daphne Wright and the boundaries of life

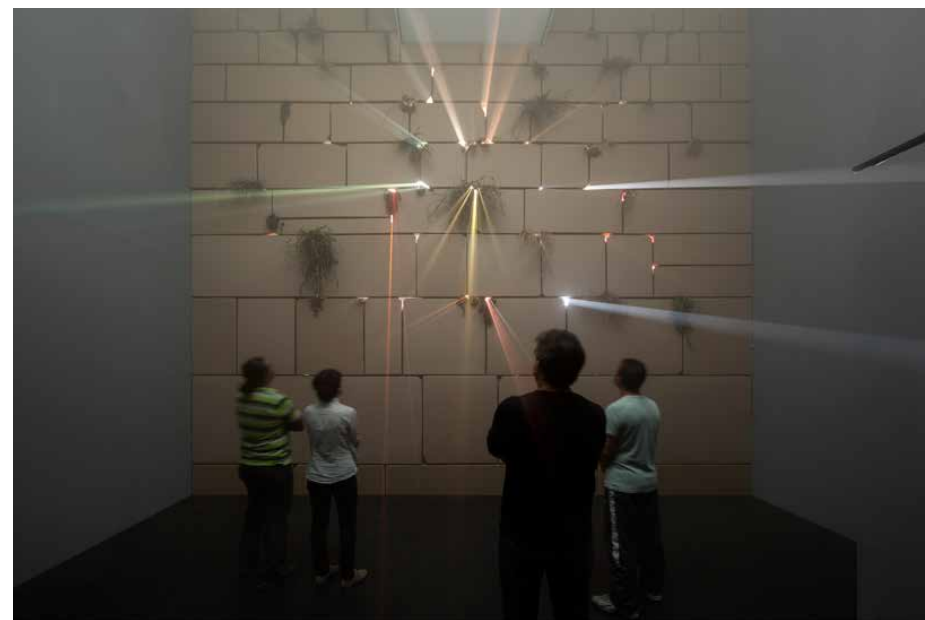

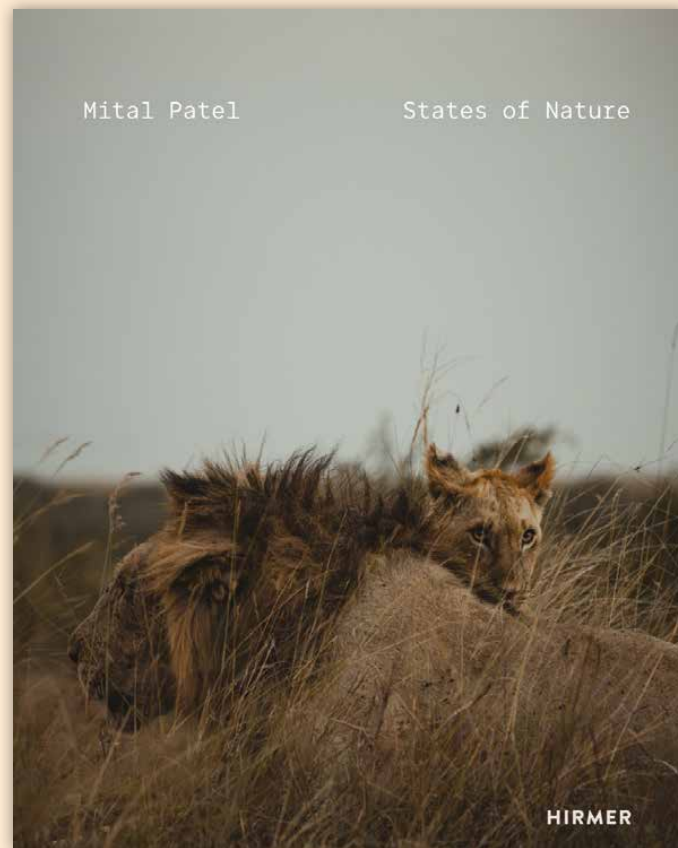

The fragile balance of nature, captured through the lens of Mital Patel



MITAL PATEL States of Nature

Mital Patel's photographs move between ice and fire, polar seas, volcanic terrain, deserts and remote wilderness. Across these extremes, he reveals with this publication a world shaped by elemental forces and deep time, where beauty and fragility exist side by side.

This book brings together a wide-ranging body of work by Patel, shaped by years of photographing remote and often inaccessible places from Greenland to South Africa. SPEAKING IN PAIRS Facing a Portrait

Can a portrait represent violence and healing at the same time? By juxtaposing iconic images created at points of conflict and growth in history, *Speaking in Pairs* examines how conflicting forces can be experienced in what initially appears to be a quiet photograph and how such evidence of being present, alive, can increase visibility or hasten our demise.

Portraits allow immortality. But who gets to be pictured and seen? Who may tell their story? *Speaking in Pairs* seeks to offer navigational references across time and geography, between works and the practitioners making, or pondering, them. It considers art's historical and contemporary response to oppression and crisis and offers representation to those impacted by extraordinary events. Leist taught in the Visual Arts Program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and is currently a professor and Photography Area Head at Hunter College, The City University of New York.

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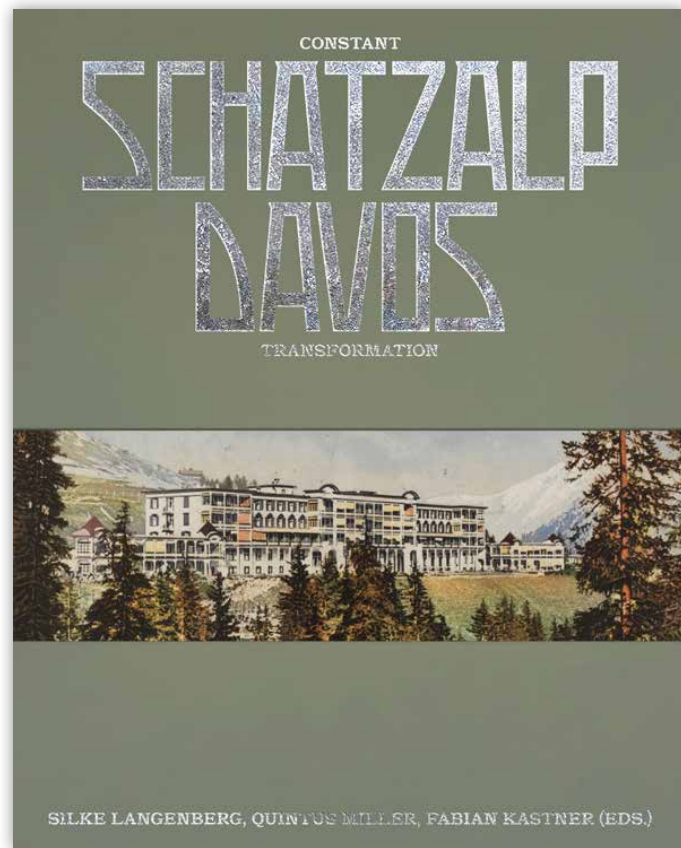

HEINZ BIENEFELD Two Family Houses Klaus Kinold Architecture Photography Series

Heinz Bienefeld (1926–1995) was a singular figure in twentieth-century German architecture. His work, as focused as it is exquisite, is remarkable for the unique way in which it synthesised tradition and modernity. Among Bienefeld’s masterworks are Babanek and Kühnen, two houses that are examined in detail in this publication.

Bienefeld’s distinct approach, which he developed in fierce opposition to the prevailing spirit of the times, is a source of fascination to the architectural photographer Klaus Kinold and the architecture writer Wilfried Wang: his ground plans were based on classical models such as Vitruvius and Palladio, he had a passion for measure and proportion, and he was devoted to the smallest details of craftsmanship and the pursuit of beauty. In his text on the “Architect of Silence”, Wang also discusses Bienefeld’s close relationships with his predominantly private clients.

Bauhaus New England serves as a visual tribute to the enduring influence of the Bauhaus philosophy on privately owned residences in New England. In a collection of striking black-and-white photographs and selected essays, the book offers intimate portraits of rarely seen historic houses and an architectural legacy at risk of fading away.

Mark Römis's images capture the homes' poetic personality as lived space through their unique blend of form, function and the organic integration of nature. The architectural portraits explore light, geometry and the dialogue between modernist architecture and nature. Essays by art historians and personal contributors, including Walter Gropius's granddaughter, Erika Pfammatter, contextualise the photos within the broader Bauhaus legacy in America and the intersection of architecture, art and transatlantic history.



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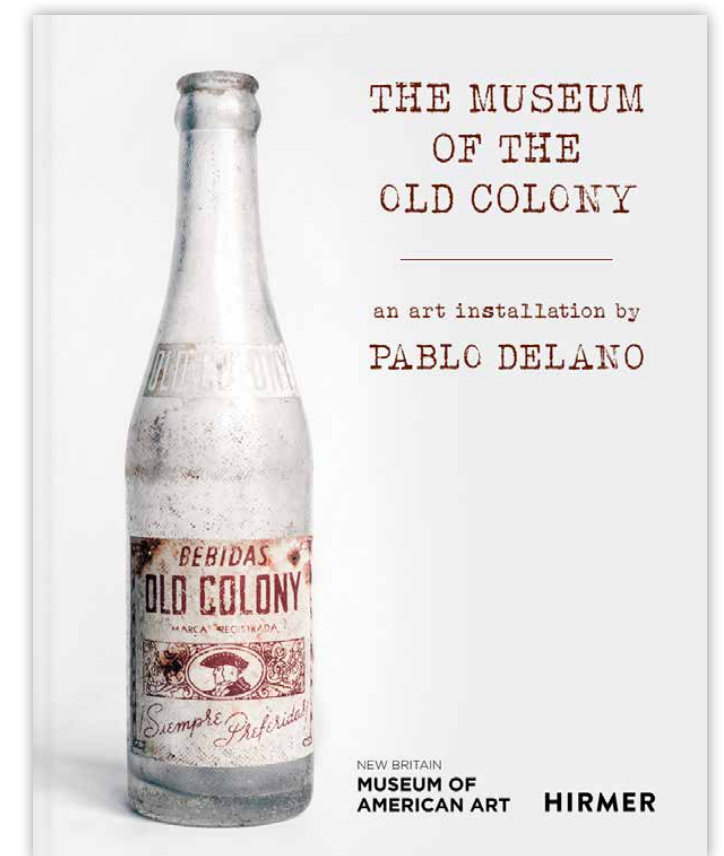
Disrupting dominant narratives of Puerto Rico – Pablo Delano's “counter-archive”

THE MUSEUM OF THE OLD COLONY: An art installation by Pablo Delano Puerto Rico in Focus, vol. 1

In his ongoing conceptual art installation, *The Museum of the Old Colony*, Pablo Delano confronts the complex legacies of US–Puerto Rican relations since 1898, when Spain ceded the island to the United States, following the Spanish-American War. This richly illustrated exhibition catalogue unpacks Delano's incisive critique of how history is seen, remembered and believed.

Featuring new photography by the artist documenting the installation, the publication reinterprets Puerto Rico's visual past and its diasporic histories through the critical framework of Pablo Delano's internationally acclaimed *The Museum of the Old Colony* project. By examining archival images, colonial ways of seeing and connections to the Puerto Rican diaspora, the book offers fresh insights into how visual narratives shape identity and memory.
